~Coyote Tips~

Presented by the Littleton Police Department

The issue of human-coyote interaction is timely as coyote pups will begin to emerge from their dens during the spring months. It is important to remember that coyotes can live in almost any environment, and many have adapted to living in an urban area. Humans should practice avoidance as much as possible when dealing with coyotes, particularly if there is a den in the neighborhood. While coyotes are typically afraid of human interaction, they can get aggressive on occasion.

The Colorado Division of Wildlife recommends that if humans come across coyotes while walking or hiking, they should make themselves as "big and loud" as possible. Using noisemakers like an air horn, or yelling and clapping can aid in deterring a coyote from investigating your presence. Humans are advised not to turn their backs on coyotes. You should face them and back away slowly if they exhibit aggressive behavior.

The city's Humane Officer, Terry Carr, is also available to answer questions, and can be reached at 303-795-3877. If you are confronted by an aggressive coyote or other wild animal, please dial 911 and a police officer will respond.

BE AWARE OF RECENT CAR THEFTS IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

There have been three car thefts in TrailMark in the first week in April. The first vehicle was stolen while it was idling in the driveway. The second vehicle was in the garage with the garage door open and the keys in the console. The third was in the garage with the garage door open and the keys in the car.

In all these instances, the vehicle owner could have done things differently to secure their property. Don't leave your keys in the car. Don't leave your car idling in the garage or the driveway. Don't open your garage door until you are leaving. Don't leave your garage door open if you are not outside. There have been five vehicles stolen within the City of Littleton over a 2 day period in April – all had keys available to the thieves.

Be aware! There are thieves that are always looking for opportunities. Don't make it easy for them to commit their crimes!

COVENENTS CORNER

As spring comes back to TrailMark, please remember your covenant on boats, trailers, and recreational vehicles. You can park these items in your driveway or on the street, but the time cannot exceed 72 hours in a 7 day period or 96 hours in a 14 day period. This is 3 days during one week or 4 days over two weeks. This gives you ample time to prepare for a trip and clean up afterwards but puts reasonable limits on how long the vehicles can be parked in the community.

PARADE & GAMES IN THE FIELD

As the last mounds of snow are melting away are you noticing that something has been chewing, scratching, rubbing or otherwise causing serious damage to your plants over winter? Hungry rabbits, field mice and voles can cause extensive damage to trees and shrubs in TrailMark as they chew the bark at the soil line and strip bark several feet off the ground. This year one homeowner had their tree nearly 50% debarked by an animal-likely an elk, deer or bear. So how do you care for a plant that has been damaged by animals over

Treating Multi-Stem trees and shrubs:

If the bark was eaten away from a multi-stem plant you are in luck. Watch for new buds to form just below the feeding damage. Prune away the damaged branches above the new buds. Your plant will be reduced in size but will recover and eventually regain its previous size and form.

Treating a Single-Stem tree with bark damage:

If the bark was eaten away from a single-stem tree, the chance for a recovery depends on the amount of bark removed from the circumference of the trunk. If the bark has been damaged all the way around then the animal has effectively girdled your tree. The only way to save a girdled tree is to perform a "bridge" bark graft. If 25-50% of the bark was removed around the circumference of the tree (damage is kept to one side) then you may loose some branches and growth may be slower but the tree will likely survive. If 20% or less of the bark was removed then the tree will likely recover.

Contact a certified arborist or a certified nursery professional for plant care advice and techniques for helping your plants survive the damage.



Design Review Committee Update

Spring is coming soon and as we move into the warm weather months, many will consider outside projects. The Design Review Committee (DRC) wants to remind you of the guidelines for approval of outdoor projects.

Examples of Exterior Projects include:

- Exterior house painting
- Landscaping
- Changes to the exterior of the home such as solar systems, and home additions
- Exterior buildings/projects such as sheds and greenhouses, decks, patios, fencing
- Projects that affect the interior yard (inside the fencing)



Exterior Painting Projects

- Before starting your painting project, submit a request to the Design Review Committee with:
 - The pre-approved scheme
 - If not using a pre-approved scheme, submit the paint color names, color samples, and where on your house you will paint each of the colors.

The DRC meets the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month. Submit your request for your outdoor project by the previous Friday to Hammersmith Management: clientservices@e-hammersmith.com. Request forms can be found on the TrailMark web site at www.trailmarkhoa.org.

The DRC is here to help maintain the aesthetics value and visual integrity of the community. We are here to help you understand the guidelines and comply with them. Always make sure to receive approval for your outdoor project before commencing work.



South Suburban Recreation Facilities Host Blood Screenings

South Suburban Parks and Recreation is hosting comprehensive blood screenings conducted by the University of Colorado Hospital from 7 to 9:30 am at the following recreation facilities:

This high-quality laboratory screening with rapid turnaround of results consists of 30 tests, including a lipid profile. Test results will be sent directly to your home. Supplemental tests can be requested for an additional cost. Participants must be at least 18 years old and 12 hours of fasting are recommended before blood is drawn. Fee is \$40 per person and no reservation is required.

Additionally, South Suburban will offer adult fitness tests in tandem with the April 21 blood screenings at Goodson Center. Tests include cardiovascular, BMI, strength, flexibility and blood pressure. all Ellen Martin for an appointment, 303-730-4610. Fee is \$15, \$10 for South Suburban residents. 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Twelve Candidates for South Suburban Park and Recreation Election

Twelve individuals have filed as candidates for three South Suburban Park and Recreation District board positions. Voters will be asked, through a mail ballot, to elect three candidates for a four-year term. Ballots will be mailed to homes mid-April and must be returned by May 4. The incumbent candidates are Mr. Harold Neal and Mr. John Ostermiller. Board members Ms. Kay Geitner and Ms. Sue Rosser will continue to serve in their terms, which are scheduled to expire in May, 2012. Mr. Jerry Call is restricted by term limitation statutes.

Final ballot order will be determined by lottery.

In addition, voters will be asked to consider an extension of the one-mill property tax, originally approved by voters in May 2000 for ten years. This question will also be on the mail ballot.

An elector is a person who, on election day, is registered to vote in the State of Colorado; and either 1) has been a resident of the District for 30 days, or 2) who or whose spouse owns taxable real or personal property within the District regardless of residence, or 3) is obligated to pay taxes under a contract to purchase property within the District.

Eligibility requires voters to be registered with their County Clerk & Recorder no later than Monday, April 5, 2010.
