The City of Littleton is responsible for the streets in our area. Their policy is to plow only the main streets where school buses travel. The only time they plow residential streets is when they become impassable. Periodically, they will come by and sand the shaded icy areas.

Also, the Littleton City Municipal Code, Section 8-1-4(A), requires Homeowners or occupants of property to remove snow and ice from adjoining sidewalks within 24 hours after each snowfall.

WHAT'S GOING ON IN TRAILMARK?

The HOA Board and the TrailMark Metro District will be making some very important decisions this year and we are asking the neighbors of TrailMark to get involved and attend the meetings. It is your money and your community. So stay informed by attending both the HOA meetings and the Metro Board Meetings. Both entities meet at 6:30 pm at the Creative Learning Center on South Carr Street. As

you read through the newsletter you will surely see some of the information that was discussed and decided upon at those meetings. We want and need your input. So <u>make an effort</u> to attend and voice your opinions so each Board can make the very best decisions possible.

TrailMark HOA Board Meetings are on the second Thursday of each odd month. So the dates are March 12th, May 8th, July 9th, September 10th, and November 12th.

TrailMark Metro District Meetings meet on the third Tuesday of the even months. So the dates of the Metro meetings are February 17th, April 21st, June 16th, August 18th, October 20th, November 12th -which is a joint budget meeting with the HOA and December 15th.

ANNUAL WALKTHROUGH OF TRAILMARK PONDS AND RESERVOIRS

Members of Denver Botanical Gardens, TrailMark HOA and the TrailMark Metro Board Biologist, Blair Leisure, did their annual review of all of the ponds and reservoirs to determine if there was additional need to sample the water that is draining into the Denver Botanic Gardens. At this time, the representatives of DBG and our biologist said that there was no need for this year, 2009. The ponds look good and the solar aerator that was installed at the Beaver Pond seems to be doing its job to keep the pond more algae-free. She will continue to monitor the pond in the spring and summer. Ms. Leisure and Mr. Parsons, of the TrailMark Metro Board, will work on signage for all of the ponds to warn people to stay off of the ice in the winter. Ms. Leisure said that there will be other maintenance issues that she will bring up with the TrailMark Metro Board to consider for this spring and summer.

TRAILMARK HOA SETTING GOALS

At the first meeting of the TrailMark HOA in January, it was suggested that the Board members meet with the TrailMark committees. It was suggested that each committee prioritize needs for the neighborhood and then reach their goals within their budgets. Board members will be meeting with those committees within the next month and then presenting the goals and budgets at the next Board meeting. Fiscal responsibility is on all of our minds these days. We, as an HOA Board, want to be diligent with the income we receive and the spending of each dollar.

LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT NEEDS ASSESSMENT IS REVIEWED BY LITTLETON CITY COUNCIL

"Response times" is still an issue. Did you know that Littleton City Council approved a contract with Rural Metro Ambulance Service to keep TrailMark under the 12 minute response time for 90% of the time? The yellow and white truck should be in the area of Chatfield and Wadsworth or Chatfield and Pierce to be able to serve the needs of TrailMark residents. The TrailMark HOA will work to get more information on this service and how this links with the Littleton Fire Department. We want to know how this will work and are we indeed safer than we were before.

TrailMark Metro District - Additional Facilities Update

More than a year ago the TrailMark Metro District (TMMD) Board, at the direction of the community, looked into acquiring the "School Site" to add facilities to TrailMark. After several meetings with the School District and the City, we are in the final process of reaching an agreement to "share" the site with the School District. With that said, we now need to answer the question: Just how much development do we wish to accomplish?

The Board is proceeding with the development of a site plan and having some initial facility design work done so that we can better define the costs involved with the building and operating of such facilities. There will be significantly more information on the design and costs of such facilities in the months to come. It is the Board's intention to poll the community on which facilities they would like to have built, after an informational campaign to better inform the community of their choices.

With the details of the cost and design still being developed, let's talk about what we do know. First and foremost, the facility will NOT INCREASE TAXES. The facilities will slightly decrease the amount of the tax reductions the Board has undertaken. In 2008, the Board cut Metro District taxes by approximately 11% (7.6 mills) and eliminated the \$192/year Recreation Fee that was collected by the District. In 2009, the Board has again cut these taxes by an additional 18% (12 mills). The Board believes we have been prudent with your (and our) money and intend to continue to do so. The facilities would be funded utilizing the approximately \$500, 000 in reserves that the Metropolitan District has accumulated in the last three years, and then financing the remaining costs.

This financing would be paid using a fund of approximately \$100,000/year, which roughly translates to \$125 (\$95 after tax deductions) or 3.6 mills for the average household in TrailMark. This


would continue to be assessed until the financing is paid off, at which time the taxes will again be reduced.

Let's talk a bit about which facilities are being considered. First and foremost, the Board is planning a meeting facility with a master plan for expansion to add additional facilities. This facility would measure 10,000 square feet in size and would contain a kitchen and restrooms. Potential additions, if desired by the community, would be a "Work-out Facility" located in one end of the building with a separate access. Also under discussion are items such as a pool or spray park, tennis courts and/or a small skate park. As for the pool, the Board is reluctant to build one based on the inputs we have received from SSPRD, Foothills and others who operate pools. Pools are moderately expensive to build, are very expensive to insure and operate, and over the long haul, become money pits (their words). This said, the Board would build a pool if a majority of the community desires we do so in the upcoming polling process. If a pool/spray park is not built as part of an initial phase, a location for one in the future will be part of the master plan.

Many questions have been asked about the use of a meeting facility within TrailMark. As active as this community is with such things as Concerts-in-the-Park, Balloon Festival Breakfasts, 4th of July parades, etc., we believe a facility would enhance these activities and provide for even more events throughout the year. In addition, groups such as the Boy Scouts and craft dealers have expressed interest in renting such a facility, along with birthday parties and wedding receptions. It would also provide a home for the Metro Board, TrailMark Homeowners Association (HOA), Star Canyon HOA's and their committees within TrailMark.

Covenant Corner



A space for the Covenant Related Information

This month, The Covenant Committee is highlighting several areas where we have been seeing a greater number of violations recently. This information is intended to help homeowners comply with the covenants signed when their home was originally purchased. A neighborhood with strong covenant compliance not only keeps its value because of ascetic appeal, but provides a safer environment for us all.

Snow Removal: Did you know that it your responsibility as a homeowner/resident to clear your sidewalk of snow within a reasonable amount of time after every snowfall? This includes the front and side of your house (if you live on a corner lot). A note to homeowners who have mailboxes by the side of their house: this is actually on the easement of your lot, and you are required to clear snow from the mailbox area.

The City of Littleton enforces this ordinance (8 - 1 - 4): PUBLIC WAYS KEPT CLEAR). If you are convicted of violating this ordinance, you could receive a fine of \$300. Further, you can be civilly liable for damages if someone should fall and be injured, on your un-shoveled sidewalk.

For the safety of us all, please get out and shovel your sidewalks. If you are unable to shovel your sidewalk because of injury or disability, please be aware that there are neighborhood kids who are willing to do odd jobs (please note the classified ads and "Teen Services" list in the TrailMark Tracks).



Inoperable Vehicles: Hopefully, none of us has something that looks like this parked car outside our house. However, please be aware that there is a City of Littleton ordinance, as well as a TrailMark covenant that restricts the type of vehicle that can be parked in view of your neighbors, and how long it can be parked. If a vehicle does not have current license tags, is incapable of being

driven, or is an unsafe vehicle; it is a ordinance as well as a covenant violation and the owner can be ticketed by the City of Littleton, as well as fined by the TrailMark HOA. The City of Littleton can impound any car (such as the above) that is left on the street for more than 24 hours.

The Covenant Committee will be watching for these types of vehicles, and car owners could receive a violation notice, as well as a visit from the City of Littleton.

"Stuff" that needs to be put away: If you have street standing basketball nets, bicycles, trash cans (or just piles of trash), recycling bins or other items of this nature – be aware that they CANNOT be left in view from the front of your house. An obvious exception is your trash can/recycling bin on trash day (which is Friday). The listed items need to be placed in the garage, or behind your fence. The Committee has received many reports of basketball hoops left on the sidewalk and blocking walkways. As for trash (on other than trash day), keep it in your garage. Not only will this help our neighborhood to be more sightly, it will also keep animals such as coyotes and raccoons from strolling through looking for an easy meal.

For the safety and appearance of our neighborhood, please help by putting your items away.

Common Area Committee Update

The Common Area Committee is currently engaged in a project to identify orphan areas within TrailMark that are in need of landscaping attention. We are going to prioritize the areas for improvement and decide upon a uniform appearance that keeps the natural arid Colorado ranch grassland theme of TrailMark. Once this is complete we will embark upon planned improvement to those areas. If you know of an area that needs attention, please give us the location. It can potentially be added to our list of orphan areas once we sort out which entity has jurisdiction over the area in question.

The areas beyond the fences and by the trails are <u>not</u> part of your yard. They should <u>not</u> be used as dumping grounds for plant refuse or any trash. They should also not be planted with any additional bushes, trees or grasses. The areas in the rough are mowed a few times each year to reduce the appearance of neglect and decrease the risk of surprises by rattlesnakes. This mowing is not meant to give these areas a manicured appearance. There is no trimming done at the fence lines or along the curbs.

The grant for the improvement of the Southwest Corner has been approved and you should see work started on that project by early Spring. It will include a table shelter and some additional trees and shrubs.

We will continue the landscape improvements in TrailMark and the project to hide or blend the utility box areas. If you have any questions or concerns about the open space, please contact us via email from the **TrailMarkhoa.org** website.

A Doggie Dilemma!

There seems to be a mistaken idea about our "open space" around the TrailMark and Star Canyon areas. Just because an area is not landscaped, or seems to belong to a specific home, some of our pet owners believe that it is "doggie open space" to be used at will by their animals.

Please be aware that there is no such thing as "doggie open space", around TrailMark. The Arboretum at Chatfield, of course, is under the auspices of the Denver Botanic Gardens and is managed and supervised by their personnel. Even during such events as the Corn Maze and Pumpkin Patch, the area is to be treated with care and consideration. The areas around our lake and holding ponds are kept in a "natural state" so that as homeowners and neighbors, we can enjoy our walks with "nature". Our extensive path system, which is the reason many of our homeowners moved here in the first place, has been developed by, and is maintained by the South Suburban Parks and Recreation. The open areas around the condominiums and patio homes are considered "common elements" of the homeowner associations.



So please be aware, that in all "open areas" around TrailMark, your pet is not to be allowed to roam free. The City of Littleton and Jefferson County Open Space require that all dogs be on a leash. Even on very cold days, it is not appropriate to allow your dog outside, while you remain warm and cozy inside. And of course, you are required to pick up after your animal!



In our "open space", in our non-landscaped areas, on our paths and trails, in our common areas, when you allow your pet to run free and use the areas as "doggie open space", you are infringing on the right of your neighbors to have a clean and pleasant environment.

News From the Star Canyon Condominiums

From the Board:

Review of the Reserve Study Complete: Earlier this year, the Board had contracted with Aspen Reserve Specialists, to do a review of our Reserve Study, originally completed in 2007. We are happy to report that as of January 1, 2009, we are considered 89% funded. Basically, this means that we have 89% of the funds needed to cover projected future capitol improvements. As most of you are aware, our percent of funding is one of the factors that can impact the resale value of your home. This, along with continued repair and maintenance of our property, is important to us all.

In 2008, several projects were initiated which required Reserve Funds. For example, we painted three buildings, did repair work on stucco, did crack seal and asphalt overlay on Freiburg Drive, did some concrete repair and replacement and replaced approximately 7 trees, with another possible 5 next summer. In 2009, we will repaint the last 3 buildings of our paint cycle.

This spring, board members and our property manager will again "walk the property" to determine if other maintenance/ repair work needs to be done. If you have noticed any area of concern, please contact Caron Realty and ask that it be added to the list for consideration.

We have heard from several people that it has been great to have parking space left for guests. However, it is especially important during our snowy times to keep the street clear of cars and trucks. This is true of both Freiburg Drive and Johnson Street. If our snow removal contractor cannot adequately clear our streets, it contributes to our ice buildup. Please continue to use your garages and driveways for parking your vehicles.

- ☑ Everyone should have a smoke detector and a carbon monoxide detector that is run off A/C with a battery back up. Night Hawk makes a good product that can be purchased @ Home Depot, Lowes, etc. (We are aware that currently it may be difficult to find a carbon monoxide detector.)
- ☑ Change furnace filters at regular intervals.
- ☑ Clean dryer vents and lint traps in hot water.
- ☑ Have a fire extinguisher with at least 10lb ABC.
- ☑ Use extension cords that are same diameter as the appliance cord.
- ☑ Use candles only under proper supervision.
- ☑ Have an Emergency Survival Kit containing water, food, and a flashlight.

Update on the Hildebrand Ranch Open Space, Surrounding TrailMark



After all the last of the required permits were issued last week, we have given Road and Bridge Notice To Proceed on the HRP Entry Drive and Parking Area project. They are starting with the crossing of Deer Creek. As of today the old unsafe bridge will be demolished and removed.

Depending on weather, the installation of the concrete box culvert will begin in the next few weeks. We will now be viewing this as a working construction site and will try to keep the public out of this area. Any support that Open

Space staff can provide in promulgating this message will help make the progress safely. We are providing Road and Bridge with a quantity of our area closed signs and having them install construction fencing to indicate the closure.

Road and Bridge is going to be using the small barn as a storage area for construction materials and Storm Water Management Documentation. They have installed a hasp and lock to help secure this area.

The Road and Bridge portion of this work will go into late spring of 2009. After Road and Bridge finishes the stream crossing, drainage and access improvements, then a separate contract will be processed for a paving contractor to install the interlocking concrete pavers. Open Space crews will then complete the project with signage and fencing.



TIPS ON CO-EXISTING WITH COYOTES



Right now coyotes in our area are exhibiting "normal" behaviors, and yet they are becoming more comfortable around people. Although there are no recent incidents in the Littleton area, other parts our of state have experienced incidents which have led to bites and sometimes attacks on small pets resulting in death. In order to co-exist, we must change coyotes and our own behaviors now.

While coyotes resemble the size of a German shepherd, they only weigh about the same as a border collie (30-40 pounds). Coyotes are not malicious, scary creatures stalking us. Coyotes are wild animals attempting to survive on natural instincts (such as preying on rabbits, ducks and small rodents - voles and mice) in an environment where more and more homes are built in their natural habitat. Coyotes seek easy meals where injury to themselves is limited. This can mean your beloved pets.

The first behavior we can change is our own, **STOP FEEDING THEM!!!!** When you leave pet food, trash, or simply intentionally leaving food around, you are tempting them into our area. Because they are looking for "easy" prey - having access to food with little risk to injury - you have essentially given them reasons to search in our area for food. The best solution in the long-term is for each individual to take personal responsibility for keeping not only pets and people safe but also for keeping our wildlife *wild*.

Here are things you can do:

- Never feed them (this includes foxes, squirrels or other wild animals). Report violations to the Division of Wildlife.
- > Feed your pet indoors or take the leftover food in immediately.
- > Set you garbage and recycle material out the morning of pickup, not the night before.
- > Keep all cats indoors cats can be preyed upon by owls and cats prey upon our beautiful songbirds.
- > Do not leave small dogs out at night.
- > Keep pets on a leash small pets will be more protected and keep larger pets from attacking coyotes which make them feel so they attack back to defend themselves but mostly to keep coyotes from getting accustomed to pets.
- Keep small children close-at-hand at all times when outdoors.
- > If you are followed by a coyote, harass them by yelling and throwing rocks.
- > Vary your routine when walking so that the coyote does not learn a pattern to follow.
- > If coyotes are spotted near a playground or school during the time when people are present, notify the police.
- If you are approached by a coyote acting aggressively (baring teeth, growling, etc.) stand your ground and fight back remember these animals are the size of a border collie. If you can, call 9-1-1 for help.
